3 Introduction to the STABILO EduPen Neo Pen and App

3.1 Unique features of the EduPen Neo App

- Digital measurement of grapho- and writing motor skills: The student writes with the STABILO EduPen Neo on regular paper.
- At the same time, the app evaluates writing and graphomotor parameters.
- Clear presentation of the writing and graphomotor abnormalities and comparison with more than 1,360 reference data (database steadily growing) in diagrams.
- Training of Grip and Writing Pressure with live feedback.
- Automatic selection of suitable exercises.
- Automated reporting with plots of the development history.

3.2 Purpose of pen and App

The STABILO EduPen Neo enables evidence-based promotion of writing motor skills because it records individual grapho and writing motor movements of the student during writing. The associated app uses this information to create a student's personal writing profile and derives exercise recommendations from it. The goal is a quick, objective analysis to facilitate the differentiated, focused training for the development of automated handwriting.

Writing begins with something akin to painting: In the beginning, conscious hand-eye coordination is required to get the desired trace on the paper. With increasing experience, these movements are automated and require less attention, but still occur faster. An automated handwriting is essential for school success: If the student does not develop automated writing, this not only leads to a significantly slower handwriting, but also puts a considerable strain on attention and working memory. If a student has to concentrate mainly on the writing process, it becomes difficult to follow the lessons at the same time. But not taking notes is also not a solution: Notes significantly improve what you have learned, especially if they are created by handwriting. Studies have shown that creative tasks can achieve up to 38% more relevant solutions when done by handwriting¹ and with handwritten lecture notes, knowledge is retained significantly better than when typing.

In order for handwriting to be used effectively, the student must be carefully introduced to automated writing. If too much is asked too early, avoidance strategies occur, the writing tilts and becomes illegible. At the same time, the writing hand will experience pain, handwriting is perceived negatively and avoided if possible. The result is a vicious circle of declining academic performance and even less use of handwriting; the disadvantaged students cannot realize their potential, which has lifelong consequences for them. With the EduPen Neo there is now an objective measuring device that shows the teacher the state of writing and graphomotor skills and recommends suitable exercises.

3.3 Installation of the EduPen Neo App

The EduPen Neo App can be downloaded from the Google Play Store rsp. the Apple AppStore. This symbol should appear on your screen after installation. When the app has launched, please allow it to access location information on Android in order to enable Bluetooth functionality. Check in the tablet's setting menus whether Bluetooth is endabled. Meanwhile, it is advisable to charge your EduPen Neo on a USB port of a computer or using the supplied charger and USB cable. The charging time is about 3 hours.

As long as the battery is not fully charged, the LED on the lower side slowly blinks orange. This light turns green when charging is complete. Next, switch on the pen and pair it with the app as described in section 3.4 below.

Softwareupdates - Co-operation between Pen and App

In order for the EduPen Neo and the App to work together in an optimum way, both should always be kept up to date. Please check regularly for new updates available in the Google Play Store rsp. the Apple AppStore. The pen firmware update process is explained in Section 4.6 on page 10.

3.4 Pairing with the EduPen Neo

On first use you need to pair your EduPen Neo with the app. Please turn on the EduPen Neo by depressing the round button on top of the pen body. There should be a noticeable click and the button should be kept pushed until the LED lights up. The LED in the EduPen Neo binks twice blue which indicates the loading of the internal programming. Next, the EduPen Neo slowly flashes blue, indicating that it is ready to connect. If the LED does not respond even after more than 2 seconds or shows a different color than blue, please proceed as described in section 11.1 on page 38.




Figure 1: List of connectable devices with one entry

After launching the app, it looks for a device that it can connect to via Bluetooth Low Energy (BLE). If this is found, it will be displayed in a dialog as shown in Figure 1. Please tap on the proper entry (which in most cases is the one with the highest signal strength) to complete the connection process. Now the flashing on the EduPen Neo should change to a steady blue light, and a moment later, the icon for the connected pen will appear in the upper left corner of the screen of the EduPen Neo app, along with the pen name. Now App and EduPen Neo can work together.

In all subsequent cases the pen will immediately

connect with the app when both are switched on until the pairing has been removed.

If the EduPen Neo app does not immediately find the EduPen Neo, it asks in the first dialog if you want to repeat the search (see also section 11.2 on page 38). Please check if the EduPen Neo flashes blue and is in the immediate vicinity of the tablet and repeat the search. The app works without the EduPen Neo, but then can not record new tests.

If you have switched the pen off and on again during operation and it should not automatically connect to the app after switching it on again, you can also start the connection process yourself in the pen settings dialog. You will find more details in section 9.1 on page 30.

3.5 Remove pairing

To disconnect a pen that is paired with your tablet device, you can either use the preferences of the EduPen Neo app or the settings menu of your tablet OS. This should only be required if you want to pair another pen with the app while the already paired pen is switched on. In single pen operation, unpairing is not necessary. In the EduPen Neo app, please go to the Settings section and select Pen Settings there. On the right side of the Pen Status line, please tap CHANGE PEN and then tap the blue in the pairing dialog that now appears and confirm that the app will now continue without a pen.

In the tablet's settings menu, select the Bluetooth entry on the left side and in the MY DEVICES list on the right side, select the line where the pen you want to disconnect is displayed. There please tap on the blue (i) and then on Ignore this device in the window that appears.

3.6 Regular use of pen and app

Using the app follows a simple pattern which is outlined below in five easy steps.

- **Step 1:** Charge your pen using the USB cable provided via a computer or the charger. The charging time is approximately 4 hours. The LED lights up green as soon as the battery battery is fully charged.
- **Step 2:** Switch on your pen by pressing the on/off switch for about one second. The pen will immediately start flashing blue and is ready to connect. If the pen does not switch on, try to keep the on/off button pressed down for longer. If the pen does not switch on even after 2 seconds, connect the charging cable and charge the pen for at least one hour. If all does not help, please consult section 11.1 on page 38.
- **Step 3:** Now start the corresponding app on your tablet. Follow the instructions on the screen.
- **Step 4:** Connect the pen to the app. After successful connection, the LED lights up solid blue. Please note: The sensors in the pen must be calibrated from time to time. The app will inform you automatically. Please follow the instructions in the app. The calibration takes about 3 minutes.
- **Step 5:** To switch off the pen, press the on/off switch for approx. 1.5 seconds until the LED goes dark. Please connect your tablet to the Internet at regular intervals to check for app updates. This will keep your app and pen up to date.



4 Taking care of your EduPen Neo

4.1 Switching the pen on and off

To switch the pen on, press the round, blue button on the top between grip zone and logo for at least a second. Success is signaled by a quick double blue blinking of the LED which indicates the boot procedure. In order to switch the pen off, press the round, blue button on the top between grip zone and logo for at least 1½ seconds, until the LED goes dark.

4.2 Pen charging

Your EduPen Neo contains a high-quality, rechargeable lithium-ion battery that should be charged regularly. To do this, open the flexible lid at the end of the pen and insert the supplied USB-micro cable into the socket provided. Please connect the other end of the cable to the supplied charger, which you plug into a power outlet. In principle, you can charge the pen at any USB port that provides at least 100 mA and up to 1000 mA of power, but we recommend that you use the included charger. As long as the battery is not fully charged, the LED on the lower side glows orange. This light turns green when charging is completed.



After about 3 hours, a completely discharged battery is fully Figure 2: Insertion of the USB cable charged again. This allows the pen to be operated for at least 15 hours.

4.3 Connecting the pen

An already paired pen will connect automatically if both pen and app are switched on and in range of each other. Connection can be forced by chenging in the pen settings menu of the app as expained in section 9.1 on page 30.

4.4 Disconnecting the pen

In order to disconnect a pen, simply switch it off or select the menu item CONNECT DIFFERENT PEN in the pen settings menu of the app as shown in section 9.1 on page 30.

4.5 EduPen Neo calibration





Figure 3: Dialog box for pen calibration

The EduPen Neo contains extremely sensitive motion sensors that need to be re-calibrated from time to time. When you first start using the pen, the EduPen Neo App prompts you for this calibration because no accurate measurements are possible without current calibration data. If you see a dialog similar to the one in Figure 3, tap on OK and in the next dialog tap on Calibrate pen. Af-

ter that, please carefully follow the instructions on the next screens. The calibration process goes through



two steps: First, the zero points of the rotation rate sensors are measured (see also Figure 4a), then the magnetic sensor in the earth's magnetic field (Figure 4b). While the pen should be immobile in step 1, in the second phase please rotate the pen around all axes so that it has pointed in as many directions as possible when you are done.

Note: When calibrating, keep a sufficient distance (at least 30 cm) between the pen and the tablet, because the magnetic field of the tablet can falsify the sensor data of the magnetic sensor.



A map of the possible directions is shown in phase 2 and will fill with light grey and green rectangles as you progress (see Figure 4b). Try to aim the pen such that more of the dark grey area becomes light grey. This map display should help you find the directions which were not covered so far. Also, if you move the pen too little or only in one direction, the green progress bar will fill more slowly. If there is then still too little alternation in the direction of the pen tip, try to twist the pen as well. This will allow the pen to point in all possible directions straight up as well as upside down, improving the calibration result.

4.6 Firmware update

STABILO is continuously improving both the EduPen Neo App and the software which runs inside the pen. Therefore, it is likely that a new version is available when you receive your pen. The software controlling the processors inside the pen is called firmware. Pen and app work best together when the latest firmware version is installed. Each time when you have received an update for the EduPen Neo App, please check whether a firmware update is available. This can be done in the pen settings menu which you reach by tapping the symbol which is located at the far right of the title bar of all screens.

Next, select Pen Settings and make sure the pen is connected with the tablet. Figure 6 shows the screen when a pen in need of an update is connected.




Figure 5: Alert in case of too little remaining battery charge

To start the update process, the pen must be connected with a remaining battery charge of at least 50% (see Figure 5 for the warning dialog when the battery level is too low). When you tap on Update Pen Software, the pen will start to blink briefly turquoise, then purple.

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Please place the pen next to the tablet and let the update procedure run its course. A progress bar will show how much has been accomplished so far (see Figure 7a). Please allow the progress bar a few seconds to start. The whole procedure will take about one minute and will inform you about a successful conclusion (see Figure 7b) and reboot the pen when finished. After the reboot, which is indicated by two blue LED flashes, the pen will start to blink blue and will connect with the tablet again. Now it can again be used normally.




Figure 6: Pen settings page for a pen with old firmware



4.7 Changing the ink cartridge

If the writing tip dries up, you will find a replacement insert in the packaging. STABILO also offers a pack of four replacement inserts for the EduPen Neo. Please do not try to replace the insert with a commercially available ballpoint pen refill - the insert of the EduPen Neo was specially developed for it.

To replace an empty insert, the grip zone part can be pulled forward and releases the insert, which can

then be easily replaced. A rotation of the grip zone part is not needed and complicates the procedure because it is guided by means of longitudinal grooves on the pen shaft. Therefore, please only move the grip zone in the direction of the pen's longitudinal axis if you want to remove or replace it.

To assemble the pen, please proceed in reverse order. Please make sure to slip the grip zone part onto the pen shaft in a straight way and not to rotate or twist it. There should be an audible click and no gap left between the grip zone and the shaft when the grip zone is correctly inserted.

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5.1 Launching the EduPen Neo App

You start the app by tapping on the icon shown on the right. If it is not in the list of apps installed on your tablet, please download the EduPen Neo app from the Google Play Store or the Apple AppStore. For the hardware and operating systems minimum requirements please see section 12 on page 40.



5.2 Start screen: The principal functions of the app

At startup, the program first tries to establish a connection with the pen. If the pen is switched on and nearby, click on the leftmost symbol shown in Figure 9a and this will be done automatically. Now the pen will be listed with its Bluetooth name in a dialog box. Touch the name entry to confirm the connection. If several non-linked pens are nearby and turned on, they will all appear in this list in the dialog box. Please select one by tapping on its entry. If no pen could be found or none from the list was selected, the app will report this with a dialog like the one in Figure 9b and offer to continue without a pen.

The start screen after connecting to the pen is shown in Figure 10a on the following page. If the pen is not connected, it looks the same, only the left icon is still visible to start the connection process manually at a later time. The meaning of each symbol is:

Persons & tests: Jump directly into the database and enter group and student data. Continue to tests if a pen is connected. Continue in chapter 6.



Messages: Here you receive messages, regarding news to the app or updates. If you can't see any messages, the function must be activated in the settings.




Worksheets & aditonal material: Show the exercise sheets and worksheets for testing. Continue in Chapter 7 on page 27



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(a) Start screen of the EduPen Neo App with pen connected


(b) Dialog for entering a group

Create a new group entry

To set up a class or group, please tap on the symbol labeled Persons & Tests and the app switches to the screen for setting up a first group. Here please tap the green button with the white plus and enter the data required for a group. Figure 10b shows the three entries to be made here. Please note that entries marked with an asterisk need to be filled in order to proceed. Once a group has been set up, students can be assigned to it. To do this, please tap the green button with the white plus again, which will take you to an input dialog as shown in Figure 11a.

If the number of people in a group exceeds the capacity of a screen, you can reach the entries for all people by swiping in a vertical direction. Tapping on the name will bring up the details of that person. Click on More details to reveal the detailed group overview (see Figure 11b). Here you can see when the first and last test were taken and which first two exercises are recommended based on the last test. In addition, by clicking on the printer icon you can print or transmit the group overview, all test sheets, test results and worksheets matching this group.


Messages


To access your messages, press the corresponding icon. Here you can view all your current messages sorted by date (see Figure 12a on the following page). You will receive information about updates and

5.3 The title bar

The red title bar has a button on the far left that takes you back to the next higher-level screen. This is followed by the title of the displayed content, for a group the group name and for a person their name and the group to which they were assigned.



On the right, depending on the status of the pen, there is an icon that shows a connected pen and its remaining battery charge or an icon that indicates that a connected pen is missing. On the far right there are buttons for the help function, messages and for the settings screen (see Chapter 9 on page 30 for more).

5.4 The navigation column

Once a student has been selected in the Persons & tests branch, the column on the left side of the screen gives access to personal data in five groups. The symbols in the left column mean:

Tests&Results Here you can view the result sheets of past tests and start new ones. For details see section 9.1 on page 30 below.



Exercises Here you can access all exercise sheets, sorted according to their focal point. playful way. See section 8 on page 29 for details.



Reports Here you can access or generate test reports. For more information see section 6.6 on page 22.



Live Feedback Here you have the opportunity to practise writing and grip pressure in a see section 9.3 on page 32.







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Profile Data This gives access to the profile data of the selcted student. playful way. See section 8 on page 29 for details.



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Material Here you can access additional material. For more information see section 7 on page 27.






Figure 13: Profile of a pupil with test details in the categorie Tests&Results

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



6.1 Test tasks

The test is divided into individual tasks for writing and graphomotor skills. Depending on how the child's writing ability is rated in the profile data, certain tasks are added or omitted. If a child is able to write, the test contains all 9 tasks. If a child can only write single letters, the test sentence (task 2) is omitted. If a child cannot write yet, all writing tasks are omitted so the test contains only 5 tasks. The blue rectangle in the upper half of the test screen is used to display the task and to navigate between tasks. Below this, observations can be recorded by selecting pre-made entries.

The row of circles above the task description shows which task has already been processed and which is currently active. An open circle stands for a task that has yet to be processed, a green circle for a correctly processed task and the circle for the currently active task is filled in white. As you edit, the row of circles will be hidden to minimize distractions.

Below the task description there are buttons that display a sample video or start the measurement. The button that should be pressed next during the normal course of the test is always highlighted in green. Left and right are buttons to move to the previous or next task. Once a task has been processed, the right button is highlighted in green to indicate the next step. If you want to discard or repeat the recording of the current task, you can easily do this by pressing the corresponding box. Then you have the option of repeating or skipping it.

Figure 14: Different screens during the process of testing. Left: Test before start; Right: Task in progress.


For tasks that require a certain amount of time to be worked on, a progress indicator is started when the pen is put down, in which a circle gradually fills. When the circle is full, the required duration has been reached and the task ends automatically (Figure 14b). To do this, simply press Start measurement.


After the last task the button Next task changes to Conclude test and a new dialog appears after the button has been pressed which asks the teacher to judge the legibility of the student's handwriting (see Figure 15a on the following page). Since this requires a subjective judgement, the teacher's assessment is adopted here. The screen then switches to the display of the test results (see section 6.5 on page 21). If you want to add a comment to a finished test, tap the green square with a pencil symbol in the bottom right corner of the test result sheet. Figure 15b on the following page shows the dialog which then pops up.

6.2 List of test tasks

Table 1 on the next page lists the separate tasks in the sequence as they are presented by the app.

The test procedure and the scope of tasks should be adapted to the possibilities of the student. For example, if the students cannot write yet, they will work on tasks 5-9. If the students can write first letters, they will work on the test tasks 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7. Tasks 8 and 9 are alternative tests for students who cannot write yet.

Testing

If individual tasks are omitted, some of the evaluation diagrams which summarize results from several tasks can no longer be meaningfully interpreted and are not displayed in the evaluation. In any case, individual evaluations are included for each task, so that the completion of only a single task already leads to a valid, albeit limited, test result. For more information see section 6.3.

In the test tasks which ask for a pattern to be repeated five times (these are numbers 4, 8 and 9), of all parameters only the duration is affected if not exactly five patterns are written. With only four or fewer patterns, the duration is shorter than in the reference data and longer for six or more. Force, speed, frequency, degree of automation or writing angle are mean values over all patterns and do not change with their number.

Note: Even though the exercises are intended for cursive, the test may also be completed in block letters if the usual handwriting of the student in everyday life is in block letters. The reference data was also collected according to this philosophy.



6.3 Hints for Testing

Position and Writing Pad

For right-handed students, a position of the therapist to the left of the student is recommended; for left-handed ones a position to the right. This makes it easier to observe the student during the test procedure. Please also make sure that the supporting hand of the students do not obscure the word they are to copy; especially smaller students want to check what to do several times within a task. Alternatively, you can have the instructions on a second sheet, so you do not have to restrict the position of the supporting hand.

In order to ensure an optimal comparability of the data with the reference data, there should be at least 5 more sheets of paper stacked below the test sheet. With a test sheet lying directly on the table (ie without more sheets below it), a higher writing pressure is to be expected.

Demonstrate Tasks

Especially the hatching tasks benefit from being explained beforehand. Either do it yourself, or use the function Show example that displays an endless video of the task.


Quality of the results

When evaluating the tasks, the app assumes that the work is done in a diligent and correct way. Spelling and calligraphy are not evaluated; the measurement is primarily about the degree of automation of the handwriting and the age-appropriate development of fine motor skills. Therefore, the app will not complain if anything other than the default text has been written, but the reliability of the evaluation will suffer from a negligent performance. Therefore, as a test supervisor, you can directly influence the quality of the tmeasurements by monitoring the processing of the tasks and by letting the student repeat them if there are any shortcomings.

6.4 Parameters used in the test result

Writing frequency (tempo) Number of up and down strokes per second in tasks 1 to 3, measured in Hertz. Experienced adult writers write at around 5 Hz.

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- **Grip pressure** Pressure exerted on the grip zone of the pen when writing. Due to sensor location, the measurement result depends on finger position. The value is given in N at the location of the sensor, but it depends on so many influencing factors that we advise against comparing the values of different people.
- **Rhythm (degree of automation)** Measurement of the speed curve within an upward or downward stroke. A wavy course of the speed indicates a lack of automation; the goal is a single movement impulse per up or down stroke.
- **Frequency** Number of up and down cuts per second in exercises 4 to 6, measured in Hertz. If you still have difficulty writing, you can still achieve high values in basic motor skills.
- **Shape (legibility)** is assessed objectively by the teacher as an answer to the question "How legible is the writing?" There is a scale from very legible to poorly legible.




Figure 16: Test result display



6.5 Test results

After the last task, the test can be completed and an evaluation as shown in Figure 16 on the previous page is displayed. Test results use traffic light colors to convey the performance relative to reference data from the same age group: While the green areas show age-related good performance, readings in the yellow or red area are grounds for recommended exercises. As the example shows, the writing and grip pressure are above the age average. Therefore, an exercise recommendation is made for the pressure, indicated by the figure of Max. Since the form is also clearly below the norm, this is the second recommendation, illustrated by the figure of Sofie.

At the bottom of the page the observations made during the test are shown; they are not included in the test recommendation, but can serve as an occasion for recommendations on pen and posture when writing.




Figure 17: Test report

6.6 Test report

To communicate the test result and further actions to the student and his parents, the program issues a test report that can be exported as a PDF or printed. An example of such a report is shown in Figure 17 on the preceding page.

6.7 Privacy protection

The student data and the graphomotoric data collected during the test represent personal data that should be protected against unauthorized access. The data collected by the app are in detail:

- All personal entries in the student master data page.
- The results of the evaluation of the sensor data for each section of the test by the app.
- If the checkbox for Record EduPen Neo sensor data is set in the app preferences, all raw sensor data corrected by only the calibration data is collected in a separate directory in the tablet. This function is for collecting reference data and should normally be unchecked.
- The reports in PDF format.

All collected data is stored locally on the tablet and it is the responsibility of the teacher to give access to the tablet data only to authorized persons. Therefore, we recommend restricting access by assigning a lock code to the tablet.

Teachers can enter their personal and their school data in the My data section in the settings area (accessible via icon in the top right corner) so it will show up in the results reports. All data collected by the app is stored locally on the device. Especially in case of iOS, this means that all data will be lost if the EduPen Neo app is de-installed.

You will also find a checkbox that allows you to give your consent to the transfer of usage data to a secure STABILO server. The information transmitted from the EduPen Neo app to our server will be encrypted and is only saved in anonymized form, so it does not allow any conclusions to be drawn about the people involved. This data helps STABILO to understand how often the app starts, when errors occur, which errors occur and details on the sequence of operations before an error occurred. This will help us especially to identify frequently occurring errors at an early stage, to analyze operating errors and to continuously improve the app.

6.8 Transfer of App Data

If you want to replace your tablet with a new one, you can transfer the data stored in the EduPen Neo app to it by making a backup copy, transferring this backup copy to the new tablet, and reading the backup copy after starting the EduPen Neo app. STABILO offers a cloud backup which is ideal for this purpose. Please note that importing a backup file will overwrite the existing database. Merging databases from two tablets onto one is not possible at this time.

Android

If you have a Windows computer handy, you can transfer the data to it (see section Copying reports to another computer below) using a program written specifically for this purpose, the STABILO Sync App. You can download the STABILO Sync App for transferring the EduPen Neo App test reports from an Android tablet here. This synchronizes the reports on your Windows PC with those on the tablet very easily and quickly.

If you are using an Apple[®] Macintosh[®], Google offers a corresponding program for Android devices. It is called Android File Transfer and can be found on the internet at https://www.android.com/filetransfer/.



The program for the synchronization of reports between your tablet and your PC can be located anywhere on the PC and does not have to be specially installed. You can recognize it by the program icon, which is similar to that of the EduPen app (picture on the right).




Figure 19: Determine the location of the report folder

When starting the program you will be prompted to connect the tablet to the PC. You do this with the USB charging cable, and after you insert it on your tablet, you see a message requesting permission to access the data on the tablet. Please tap Allow here. This will change the display of the synchronization program from the one shown in Figure 18a to the one in Figure 18b.

Before you begin copying by tapping the green circle with the arrow inside, please check to which folder of the PC file system the reports will be copied. By tapping on the command Specify Report Folder you will open a file dialog in which you can specify the destination folder on the PC.

After copying is completed, use the Open in Explorer command to display the folder on the PC to which the reports have been copied. A successful synchronization is displayed with a matching icon in the middle between the tablet and the PC symbols (see illustration 20).




Apple iOS


To make it difficult for other programs to access the EduPen Neo app data, the databases are all contained in a folder that only the EduPen Neo app can access. Therefore, we recommend using our cloud backup feature here.


Alternatively, if you have an Apple Macintosh with operating system version OSX 10.14 or earlier or a Windows PC, you can view the backup file via iTunes and copy it to the computer, then connect the new tablet and copy the backup file there via iTunes. As of macOS 11 and above, if the iPad is connected to the Mac with a USB cable, it can share data via the Finder. If you want to transfer the data wirelessly, Apple offers synchronization via iCloud.

Please connect your Apple iPad to a computer via a USB cable and start Apple iTunes. In iTunes, open the iPad administration by clicking the tablet icon in the upper left corner of the screen. The small picture on the right shows this symbol encircled in red. If you use a Macintosh with macOS 11 or higher, open the iPad management in the Finder by clicking on the iPad icon in the left bar of the Finder window.

In the view that then opens, please select the Data Sharing entry in the list on the left (circled in red in Figure 21a) and then select the EduPen Neo App in the middle column that opens as a result (also circled in red). This will bring up a list of file directories in the right column. The one named Reports contains all the PDFs and can be copied to the connected computer for synchronization simply by clicking Save. The folder named Backups contains all the backup files that you can use to restore a damaged database or transfer it to another device. In macOS 11 and above, first click on the entry for the iPad in the left column, then on the icon of the app in the app overview that opens, and then on the Reports folder icon, which contains the PDFs of the reports. If the iPad should not be displayed, please check in the Finder settings if the checkmark for CDs, DVDs and iOS devices is set for the sidebar.

This opens a view like in Figure 21a. Select the entry Data Sharing (circled in red in Figure 21a in the list on the left side) and then the EduPen App (also in the middle column that opens; circled in red). This will cause a list of directories to appear. The one named Reports contains all PDFs and can be easily copied to the connected computer for synchronization by clicking on Save in the lower right corner.

After installation, please run the EduPen Neo app at least once to create the internal folder structure. For the details of accessing the tablet data, please refer to the following section on copying the data to another computer.

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The app saves reports as PDF files, so you can print them or pass them on to your students or their parents. Therefore, the name and address of your school will also be requested in the settings, so that they can be included in the PDF. You can send messages directly from your tablet when you set up an email account. You can insert the reports as an attachment to these messages. In parallel to the report, a collection of all individual results will be saved in a second PDF file on your tablet. Alternatively, you can transfer the reports to another computer for printing or distribution.

Please refer to the section 6.9 on the following page, because sending by mail uses the same mechanism as printing a file.

6.9 Printing the reports

All reports and exercise sheets are saved as PDFs and can be printed. The following section explains printing in Android, followed by the explanation for iOS. Both versions have the same entry point: In the report view, please tap on the green printer icon in the upper right corner (see Figure22). Alternatively, you can export the reports and exercise sheets to another computer and print them from there. How to copy the files to another computer was explained in the previous section.

Android

Since Android 8, you can print directly from the app. In older versions, you had to install a printer program from the printer manufacturer and select the document to be printed in it

and select the document to be printed in it. To do this, please download the corresponding app from the Google PlayStore and follow the instructions of the printer manufacturer. In the printing app, you first need to connect to the printer. After that, you can select the report files and print them via the app. Usually, the app will offer a document folder called Saved Documents or Documents. In this, please open the EduPen Neo section. There you will find the sections Backups and Reports. In the reports section, you will find all the PDF files of the EduPen Neo app; please select the one you want and follow the instructions of the app to print it.




Figure 23: Android selection dialog




Figure 22: Printer symbol in the top right corner

Figure 22 shows the report as it has been displayed since Android 8. Please note the green printer icon in the upper right corner, which is circled in red. When you tap on this, the selection dialog shown in Figure 23 opens first, in which please tap on the icon titled "Print Service". If you want to send the report as a PDF, you will also find a link to the mail program in this dialog.

In the dialog that now follows, you must select the printer (Figure 24a on the following page, circled button in the upper left) and then, when it is connected and displayed, initiate the print command. In Figure 24b on the next page this happens on a Brother brand printer.

Apple iOS




Figure 25: iOS selection dialog

To print a report, tap the green Send Report printer icon at the top right of the page where the report is displayed. In Figure 22 on the preceding page this is circled in red. A window will open with a choice of options to share or print the report. Please tap on the printer icon in the bottom row (also circled in red in Figure 25) to initiate the printing process. This requires a printer that can be accessed via AirPrint over WLAN. If you want to send out the report via mail, select the corresponding icon in the dialog shown in Figure 25.

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7 Exercises

The exercises can be found by either clicking on Worksheets & Additional Material from the main menu or by going to Exercises from the individual profiles. When you go to the Exercises from the individual profiles, exercise recommendations are displayed based on past tests and completed exercises can be ticked off. Regardless of where you accessed the exercises from, they are always structured the same way. You can access the packages you have already purchased or purchase more. The first package is free of charge. The individual packages are structured according to funding priorities. These are then sorted in increasing order of difficulty.

7.1 Training focus

Pressure

This is subdivided into writing and gripping pressure. The focus of pressure is all about the correct pressure when writing on the paper and on the pen grip zone. For beginners this is usually too high, which can easily lead to cramps. In these exercises, a pencil is used to try to create sometimes weak and sometimes intense lines to give a feeling for the correct pressure.



The symbolic figure for the pressure exercises in the pre-school and primary school exercise packages is Max.

Shape

The correct shaping of letters makes the handwriting easier to read. In this focus, swings and shapes are trained. These exercises are suggested when a good level has already been reached in the other focal points.



The symbolic figure for the shape exercises in the pre-school and primary school exercise packages is Sofie.

Speed

Automated writing allows to write about three times faster than if the writing movement is determined by hand-eye coordination. The exercises of this focus therefore train the rapid writing with the right momentum, without the need for constant checking and



The symbolic figure for the speed exercises in the pre-school and primary school exercise packages is Leo.

Rhythm

In automated writing, the hand swings at its natural frequency to produce the up- and downstrokes of the handwriting. Deficits in rhythm mean that the lines of the up- and downstrokes are often corrected, which happens especially when writing on lined paper, because the students have to be especially careful to place the writing on or between the lines. In this focus, students learn to use the pen in fast, automated movements. The symbolic figure for the rhythm exercises in the pre-school and primary school exercise



packages is Lena.



7.2 Fine motor skills

In addition to the worksheets for the four main exercise sections, relaxation exercises are included to promote fine motor skills. It is not necessary to print out these worksheets; it is sufficient to demonstrate or explain the presented task.

7.3 Further material

Pictures for writing teams

Here you can find pictures of the four characters Max, Sofie, Leo and Lena in DIN-A4 format, which are intended for printing and posting. For example, if you build a course with the different exercises, you can use these pictures to mark the individual stations.

Test sheet





8 Live Feedback



The live feedback is intended to show the children in a playful way when they apply too much or too little pressure on the paper and / or the grip zone of the pencil. It can also be used as additional training units.

8.1 Exercise selection




Figure 28: Live Feedback

You can choose from different playful tasks for grip or writing pressure and select the tasks to be worked on either individually or together by ticking them. You can choose between 6 different exercises for writing and grip pressure (see Figure 28a for a list). After you have selected the exercises, you can start the live feedback.

8.2 Live Feedback Procedure

The execution is similar to the normal test. The upper blue menu part (see Figure 28b) navigates through the exercises and explains the task. You can also display an example again. Below the picture explaining the exercise, you can then see the scale from 'too little' to 'too much pressure', as also shown in the picture. This shows the current writing or grip pressure while performing the exercises and serves as a good demonstration in front of the children. The measurement is made using the built-in sensors in the EduPen Neo. If the blue dot is in the green area, the pressure is good. If it is in the red range, the pressure is too firm. There is no time limit for performing each live feedback exercise. To start the exercise, simply press Start, and to stop the exercise, press Stop. After completing the live feedback, simply press Finish on the last exercise. After finishing the live feedback, an evaluation is generated.

Additionally, you can turn on the sound to hear when the normal pressure range is left and the force becomes too hard without having to look at the display. You can turn the feature on and off via the small speaker icon () on the left of the blue box. The volume is controlled by the tablet volume.

After completing the live feedback, simply press "Finish" on the last exercise.

9 Settings

Tapping on the Settings icon (, located in the top bar on the far right) takes you to the Settings menu. If no student is selected, it allows to adjust application-wide settings in four groups. The symbols in the left column mean:

Pen Settings Here you can view or adjust settings for the EduPen Neo. For details see section 9.1 below



App-wide Settings Here you can view or adjust settings for the app. For details see section 9.1 below.



School settings Here you can enter or change the name and address of your school. For more information, see section 9.3 on page 32.



Legal Notices Here are the imprint, the links to the privacy agreement and the licenses to the software libraries used in the app.



In-app purchases This item allows you to add exercises for additional school grades to the collection in your EduPen Neo App. Here you can purchase additional exercise packages by class or school level. The purchase is one-time, the prices are school licence prices. You can also restore purchases that have been made. For more details, see section 9.5 on page 32

9.1 Pen settings




Figure 29: Pen settings

In this window, the name of the currently connected pen is displayed in the first line. In the second line, the connection status is displayed on the left and on the right, this connection can be disconnected to connect another pen to the EduPen app. If no pen is connected, the connection process can be restarted here. The third line is used to calibrate the sensors, which can be started with the button on the right. In the fourth line, the firmware version running on the pen is displayed on the left and a new version can be written to the pen with the button on the right if necessary. Figure 29 on the left shows the window if everything is correct and up to date.

In both cases it is sufficient to tap the corresponding commands on the right side of the respective line to update. You will then be guided through the individual steps of the update procedure. Chapter 4.5 on page 9explains the calibration procedure while Chapter 4.6 on page 10 explains the firmware update procedure.

Calibration takes place in two steps: When the pen is connected, please place it horizontally at some distance from the tablet (see also section 4.5 on page 9). This serves to determine the zero levels of the

yaw rate sensor. After a few seconds, you will be asked to rotate the pen in the air such that it points in as many directions as possible. You will see a dark grey rectangle which fills with with green or light grey small rectangles depending on the pen's orientation. The rectangle is representative of all the possible diections and will be filled with the smaller rectangles if magnetic measurements have been recorded in the corresponding direction. Section 4.5 on page 9 explains this process in detail.

Firmware is the software permanently installed on a device. STABILO always strives to improve it and, therefore, provides you with a mechanism to download the latest version onto your EduPen Neo. To do this, the pen must be connected and charged. Section 4.6 on page 10 explains this process in detail.

9.2 App settings




Figure 30: App settings

In the first line you can switch on the recording of the transferred data, which can be helpful for further analyses. For the analysis within the scope of the app this has no meaning.

This window is important because the second line provides information about the version of the EduPen app. If you contact STA-BILO with questions about the app, we will ask you about the version of your app. Ideally, you should look here before you make the inquiry and include the version number in your request.

In the middle of the window you can set

whether usage and measurement data can be evaluated by STABILO. If you refuse your consent, all data collected by the app will remain on the tablet. If you agree, selected data will be encrypted and transferred anonymously to a STABILO server to help the developers to further improve the app.

In the bottom lines you can create backup files manually or restore a previous state by loading the backup file. You can select where those backups are stored: locally on the tablet or encrypted on a remote fileserver. If the tablet is lost or changed, local data cannot be transferred to a new tablet.

Data backup

The EduPen Neo App offers several ways for backing up its data. Examples are:

- Automatic backup on the tablet (local backup).
 The app creates backup files at regular intervals
 - The app creates backup files at regular intervals which are stored in a separate directory in the tablet's file system. By tapping on **RESTORE FROM BACKUP**, you can call up an overview of the backup files and select one from them (see Figure 31 on the following page). The name suffix AutoBackup in the file name indicates whether this backup file was created automatically. After selecting one of the files, the current data of the app is deleted and replaced by that of the backup file. If you do not want to restore any data, tap the \times in the upper right corner.
- 2. Manual backup on the tablet.
 - To create a backup file outside the automatic cycle, tap on the line Manual backup on CREATE BACKUP. This is recommended if you want to try something out and be sure to be able to restore the unchanged state of your data afterwards. In both cases, all data remains on the tablet. This carries the risk that if you lose the tablet or switch to a new one, all data will be lost. In order to be able to back up data to a second carrier, there is the option of exporting it by connecting the



tablet to a PC or Macintosh (see section 6.8 on page 22). Alternatively, STABILO offers storage on a computer on the Internet, for which the third option is used:

3. Data backup in the cloud.

If the storage location is set to Cloud, a compressed, encrypted and password-protected archive of your data on the tablet will be created and uploaded to a server within the EU. When creating the archive, the app tells you a randomly selected identifier that you need in order to retrieve the data from the cloud later. Additionally, you will be asked to enter a password of at least 5 characters in length, which should also contain at least one uppercase letter, one lowercase letter and one digit.



If you want to pull the data back to your tablet, the password will suffice. However, if you want to copy the data to another tablet, you will also need the identifier. STABILO does not know your password or identifier, so we will not be able to help you if you have lost either of them.

Caution: Restoring an old state from a backup **deletes the current data** in the app! If you want to keep the current state, perform a manual backup before restoring.





Figure 32: School settings







10 Database for comparing measurements

10.1 Data collection

Each measured value is displayed relative to the measured values of a comparison group. These criteria must match to form a valid comparison group:

- Age
- Gender
- Handedness

Therefore, it is also necessary to specify these three parameters when adding a student entry (see section 5.2 on page 14). Only then is the correct selection of the reference data sets possible.

To generate the standard ranges for each individual parameter, approximately 1200 reference data sets from different age ranges were recorded. For each reference data set, the complete test was carried out with 9 test tasks and the parameters age, gender, education level and handedness were recorded². At least 50 records were recorded for each of the following 20 age groups: 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17-20, 21-30, 31-40, 41- 50, 51-60, 61-70, 71-75 and 76-80-year-olds. Attention was paid to an equal distribution between male and female subjects. The proportion of left-handed individuals corresponds approximately to the average of the general population.

10.2 Calculation of the standard ranges

From these results the limits of the standard ranges were determined for each age group by empirical quantiles:

- 0.25-quantile or lower quartile (the reading below 25% of the results)
- 0.5-quantile or median (the reading that divides the bottom 50% of the results from the top 50%)
- 0.75-quantile or upper quartile (the reading below 75% of the results)

The limits of the standard range were calculated separately for each of the above-mentioned age groups and for each result parameter. For example, for the parameter "degree of automation" there is a different standard range for 9-year-olds than for 15-year-olds. The handedness and gender play no role in determining the normal ranges.

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


Figure 36: Distribution of the writing frequency in the test task "test sentence" for 8-year-olds. The normal distribution shown in green was calculated with the help of the mean value and the variance of the stored standard data.

The graph in Figure 36 on the next page shows the limits, their definition and the reference to the standard range using the example of the writing frequency when writing the test sentence with 8-year-olds. The figures lower quartile (0.25-quantile), median (0.5-quantile) and upper quartile (0.75-quantile) show for the writing frequency that the slowest 25%, 50% and 75% of the scorers are below the respective limit. Specifically, this means that in order to reach the normal range for the writing frequency, the student's test result must be better than the results of 50% of the stored reference data. To get above the mean

² With the exception of the test sentence; this was only collected in the reference data once the subject was comfortably writing a full sentence.

value of the standard range, the student's test result must be better than 75% of the stored reference data.

For the parameter writing frequency, the goal is to achieve the highest possible value. The ranges are defined in the graph above. For the parameters duration, force and degree of automation, the goal is to achieve the lowest possible value and the normal range is defined below the median (in the direction of the lower quartile). For better clarity, however, the test results in the EduPen Neo App are plotted in such a way that the standard range can also be found on the right-hand side for these parameters. The aim of the writing angle is to achieve the most balanced angle possible. Therefore, for the writing angle, the normal range is defined as the range that is between the lower and upper quartiles. Table 2 on the following page gives an overview of the areas covered by the result bars. Please note that only at the right edge of the bar for the force and for the degree of automation a physical limit was chosen, which can not be undercut. All other result bar boundaries were chosen to give better resolution at the center of the bar, at the price of extreme values bunching at the upper and lower limit. For open-ended parameters, two standard deviations (σ) of the median were set as the left boundary, so that for normally distributed results, in test of 40 samples one will lie on the left edge of the bar.

The 0.25 or 0.75 quantile is not always in the middle of the normal range: Depending on the reference data of the age group, more than one quarter of the subjects can achieve a value of 1 for the degree of automation. Then, if the plot remained unchanged, the center of the normal range would fall on the right edge of the bar. Therefore, the right edge was set to the 0.25 quantile and the normal range is at least from NIV = 1 to NIV = 1.2. Thus, the lower range of possible results is better resolved than the upper range, which should be helpful in the practice of occupational therapy.

10.3 Assignment of the measurement results to the standard ranges

In the evaluation, the course of the quartiles and the median over age is smoothed out. This results in an analytic function of age for each parameter. The bases are the mean of the respective age group. Since the reference data only includes the age of the probands rounded to the nearest years or decades, the mean is the middle of the age group; the bases are thus: $5\frac{1}{2}$, $6\frac{1}{2}$, $7\frac{1}{2}$, $8\frac{1}{2}$, $9\frac{1}{2}$, $10\frac{1}{2}$, $11\frac{1}{2}$, $12\frac{1}{2}$, $13\frac{1}{2}$, $14\frac{1}{2}$, $15\frac{1}{2}$, $16\frac{1}{2}$, 19, 26, 36, 46, 56, 66, $73\frac{1}{2}$ and $78\frac{1}{2}$ years. Therefore, a student who is 8 years and 3 months old at the time of the test is compared to a reference value composed of the $\frac{3}{4}$ -weighted value

of the 8 year old probands and the ¼-weighted value of the 7 year old probands. This ensures that a suitable comparison value is calculated for each age. If one would compare the same student only with the 8-year-old probands, the reference group would be on average a quarter of a year older than the probands.

An inflexible assignment would be particularly disadvantageous at an age jump: A measurement shortly before the 9th birthday of the student would still be compared with the now half a year younger 8 year old probands, another shortly after the 9th birthday, however, would now be compared with 9 year old probands who already on average half a year older. An unexplained drop in performance relative to the now by one year older peer group would be the result. One consequence of this flexible calculation of the comparison values is that each new test is compared with a new reference value adapted to the current age of the test person. In a history plot plotting the numerical results of several measurements, the progression of the absolute quantiles would shift over the test period. However, if one only plots the relative position of the result to the quantiles valid at the respective test time, their course in the history plot remains constant over time.

In order to reproduce the relative as well as the absolute value of the measurement results in the detail overview, the measured value is added to the respective test date as a number in each history plot in addition to the point of the measurement. Therefore, when comparing the numerical measurements with the relative measurements in the history plot, it is important to keep in mind that the relative scale for the relative measurement results will shift over the test period. In extreme cases, this can lead to an improvement in the numerical values in the table over the test period, but to a decrease in the relative measured values in the history plot. However, this is easy to explain: In this case, the student's performance has objectively improved over the test period, but not enough to keep up with the simultaneous improvement of the reference data. In other words, in this case, the peer group has achieved a greater improvement in the readings over a similar period than the student.

Error messages and solutions to possible problems

11 Error messages and solutions to possible problems

11.1 Problems with the pen

Loss of Bluetooth-Connection

Since the EduPen Neo uses up a large part of the possible Bluetooth Low Energy connection bandwidth, several Bluetooth devices in the immediate vicinity may reduce the available bandwidth so much that the remaining bandwidth for the EduPen Neo is insufficient. Turn off unnecessary Bluetooth wireless technology enabled devices if your app is unexpectedly disconnected from the EduPen Neo.

Please note that devices that use the Bluetooth standard 2.0 will reach a higher transmission power than Bluetooth Low Energy and may therefore be particularly damaging for the bandwidth of Bluetooth Low Energy enabled devices.

Unstable Bluetooth-Connection

Sometimes it may help to reset the bonding information on both the pen and the tablet. For the EduPen Neo to reset bonding infromation, hold the on/off switch depressed after switching it on. You need to press the switch continuously for at least 12 seconds until you see a violet double blink which indictates that the bonding information has been reset.

How to reset the bonding information on your tablet is explained below in section 11.2 on the next page.

Pen does not connect

If the pen does not connect, please check the following:

- When the pen flashes blue, it is ready to connect. If it flashes purple, please fully charge the EduPen Neo first.
- Is Bluetooth activated on the tablet? Please check this in an Android tablet under Settings Connections Bluetooth "On", in the iPad under Settings Bluetooth "On".
- Has the location permission been granted? Only relevant for Android: Please check under Settings Apps EduPen Neo Permissions Location "On".
- If the pen still does not connect, turn off the pen and push the power button until it flashes purple. This takes approximately 10 seconds. In the app, press Connect pen. If a pop-up appears "Pair pen", press OK. Once the pen shows a continuously blue light, it is connected.

The calibration fails

The calibration requires sufficient coverage of possible directions during the calibration of the magnetic sensors. It will allow for up to 2500 measurements but if that still leaves too many directions uncovered, the calibration ends with an error. Please repeat the calibration and pay attention to the direction where the small rectangles light up. Try to move it into the dark areas of the rectangle in order to lighten up as much fo the rectangls as possible.

The LED flashes orange

A slow orange flashing of the LED during charging indicates a normal charging process. A quick single orange flashing during charging indicates too high internal temperatures. Please locate the pen in a cool and shady spot, let it cool down for a few minutes with the charger disconnected and then continue with

the charging. If, however, the LED shows a periodic orange double flash after the pen is switched on, the firmware has registered a hardware failure during the self-test of the electronics of the pen. Switch the pen off and on again. If the flashing still occurs after a restart, please contact STABILO support.

The LED flashes purple

A purple flashing LED during operation indicates a deeply discharged battery. The pen will shut down shortly thereafter and should be charged immediately. A purple flashing LED during charging indicates that the battery voltage is below the normal range. This is normal after a deep discharge and will change to a steady orange light when the voltage has risen sufficiently. A purple LED can also be observed when copying a new firmware and is completely normal.

LED at the bottom of the pen does not blink blue

If the LED light does not respond when the pen is switched on, please check whether the battery needs to be charged. If connecting the pen to a USB power source still does not switch on the LED, something inside the pen is probably damaged. Please send the pen in for repairs as described in section 11.1.

The time between two battery charges becomes noticeably shorter

The EduPen Neo contains a high-quality lithium-ion battery that can run for hundreds of charging cycles. If you find that its capacity decreases noticeably, STABILO can install a new battery for a processing fee. Due to the compact design of the pen, we advise against changing the battery yourself.

Caution: Danger of explosion due to improper battery replacement! Disposal of used batteries according to instructions.

11.2 Problems with the app

Pen was not found

If the search dialog box does not contain a single entry, no pen could be found. In this case, please check:

- 1. Is the pen turned on and blinking blue? If so, repeat the pen search. Not always a connection is possible immediately.
- 2. Is the pen close enough to the tablet? The range of the Bluetooth Low Energy connection of the EduPen Neo is only a few meters.
- 3. BLE on Android requires that apps be allowed to determine the location. Therefore, in Android devices, the location service must be switched on to ensure successful connection. You can do this via the app settings.
- 4. Sometimes it is necessary to cancel an already existing pairing with the tablet, so that the pen connects afresh with the app. Please follow the instructions in section 9 on the next page for Android devices.



- Error messages and solutions to possible problems 5. If all else fails, try restarting the tablet. To do this, follow the instructions of your tablet for a reboot.
- 6. If this does not work, you can try resetting the tablet's network settings. Please follow the instructions in section 11.2 which deals specifically with Android devices.
- 7. If this does not work, check if the pen is supported by your tablet and whether other BLE devices can connect to it. The radio module in the EduPen Neo only supports the Bluetooth Low Energy (BLE) standard. In the settings of the tablet, check which Bluetooth wireless technology enabled devices it finds. If the pen does not appear in the list of BLE devices, make sure that your tablet actually supports BLE and that the BLE functionality is not broken. BLE support is indicated by terms such as "Bluetooth 4.0 or above" or as "Bluetooth smart" in the device description.
- 8. If the search yielded a result, the dialog fills up with entries of the MAC number and BLE names of the found BLE devices. Please tap on the entry that represents your EduPen Neo.
- 9. Android: Cancel pairing with the tablet

Sometimes it helps to cancel an existing pairing first in order to remedy connection problems. To do this, tap on the Settings icon in the Android home screen and then on the window that opens in the left column on the menu item Connections and on the right side on the entry Bluetooth. This displays the list of paired and visible Bluetooth devices (see Figure 37a). The linked EduPen Neo entry has a small sprocket symbol (a (red arrow) in the line of this entry on the right, which you can tap on. This allows you to either rename or disconnect the pen.

Android: Reset network parameters

To do this, tap on the Settings icon in the Android home screen and in the window that opens, in the left-hand column, click on the menu item General management (near the bottom of the list) and on the right-hand side the entry Reset. This will display a selection of options for resetting several settings. The second (framed in red on the right in Figure 37b) concerns the network settings. Please note that after resetting, you will need to re-enter the password for Wi-Fi access.

Please avoid tapping on any of the other menu items! Resetting all settings means you will need to re-enter all the settings you have made so far, and if you reset the tablet to factory settings, all the apps you have installed before will also be deleted.


